### **Velma Pearl Hix Hill**



Velma Hill is the daughter of Duvall pioneers, Arthur and Pauline Hix.

Calling Duvall home comes naturally for Velma. She was born in her parents' Duvall home on December 3, 1914, one hundred years ago. Velma lives in the same house today, and has never lived anywhere else. As a girl, Velma loved participating as a Camp Fire Girl. The Duvall troupe brought her many happy memories and outings. A highlight was a week at Camp Sealth on Vashon Island.

Velma attended the Duvall School and was valedictorian of her class, graduating from Duvall High School in 1932. Upon graduation she walked across the alley from her house and went to work full time in her father's store, Hix Market (now Duvall Flowers), on Main Street in Duvall.

When she was twenty-seven, Velma took the Postmaster's exam and became the Postmaster of Duvall. Franklin Delano Roosevelt signed her appointment certificate, which proudly hangs in her



home. The post office was moved into Hix's Market and EVERYONE in Duvall came to the store for their mail. Velma truly knew everyone in Duvall at that time, and everyone in Duvall knew Velma.

In1947 she married Cliff Hill. Her new husband moved into the Hix home and Velma and Cliff looked after her parents in their senior years. Cliff joined Velma working in the store and he also became a clerk in the post office. Hix Market and the Duvall Post Office were on the corner of Main and Cherry until 1977. Sophie Herzog Fox, a wonderful friend, worked with Cliff and Velma to round out a great team that greeted customers at Hix's in the store and Post Office for thirty years.

In addition to working in the store, Velma and Cliff built some of the first rentals and apartments in Duvall. At the time, folks doubted their wisdom as to whether Duvall would grow to support such an enterprise.

In 1953 Velma and Cliff had their one child, a daughter they named Paula Pearl. This new addition caused the family home to expand to include three generations.

Music was always a big part of the Hix household. Velma, and her sister Mary, studied piano and often played for community events. Mary played for silent pictures at the early theater in Duvall as well as theaters up and down the valley. Velma played as pianist or organist in the Duvall Evangelical Methodist Church, the Cherry Valley Grange and Holy Innocents Catholic Church. As a fine alto she sang in the Women's Choral Society that rehearsed in Monroe and gave concerts in Everett and Seattle.

The death of her husband Cliff in 1977 ushered in the closing of Hix's store and the beginning of Velma's retirement. Throughout retirement Velma has taken many cruises, visited her daughter and family, and until the 1990's managed rentals she and Cliff built.

Velma remains so very proud of her Duvall roots, and her greatest joy is continuing to live in her home of the last 100 years.

A big "happy birthday" to Velma, from the Duvall Historical Society!

### **Cherry Valley Shingle Mill**

The most well-know shingle mill in the lower valley was the Cherry Valley Shingle mill. It operated from 1911 until 1925 and was located on the riverbank at present-day Taylor Landing Park. It employed about 40 men when the town population was less than 300.

Boxcars were loaded with shingles for shipment all over the country. A dynamo was installed and the mill also became a source of electricity and water for the town.
