
Guest Speaker: Karen Haas

Have You Visited Duvall's Little Postal Museum Lately?



The next time you're at the Duvall post office, make sure to pause for a moment to look at Washington state's smallest museum. At 32 inches by 32 inches, the Little Postal Museum is just that – little – and it decorates one wall of the lobby. Little Postal Museum curator, Tom Matthiesen, rotates exhibits, and most recently has installed a display about "Moving the Mail to Duvall". The exhibit includes photos taken in 1912 by Darius Kinsey.

"If you look carefully you can just make out, parked under the trestle, the postal carrier wagon that at the time carried mail from Monroe down to Duvall. It is very possible that the man standing on the tracks is Mr. Johnny Austin, the carrier, who had told the Monroe Monitor newspaper earlier in 1910 that he 'would not trade his job for that of the president'. At the time a rural carrier received a yearly sum of \$1,100."


Take a look the next time you're in the neighborhood, to learn about the local history currently on display.
