# **Dougherty Farmstead Open Houses Are Here!**


On Sunday, May 4<sup>th</sup>, the Dougherty House resumed its summer open houses. Doors opened at 1pm and docents guided visitors through the

# Look for Us In this Year's Duvall Days Parade

If you're standing on the sidelines at this year's Duvall Days parade – held on Saturday, May 31<sup>st</sup>, at 10am on Main Street – you'll most likely catch a glimpse of the Duvall Historical Society as we plow down the street in our covered wagon. This year a tractor will pull the wagon as Historical Society members wave from inside.



### Chautaugua: A Form of Early Duvall (And Elsewhere) Entertainment

It's almost here again – Duvall Days – that great weekend in late May and early June when the town gathers to watch dancing horses, to hear marching bands, to eat pancakes, and to watch runners dart up Stephens St.

But what type of entertainment existed in the Snoqualmie Valley prior to the Duvall Days festival?

Picnics and swim parties were two early forms, as was pasture baseball, as well as impromptu one-person plays performed by children upon the stages of old tree stumps. The Snoqualmie Valley Fair was held at times on the Cherry Valley school grounds, and in the early days of Duvall – before its official incorporation in 1913 – another form of traveling entertainment began to come to town: the Chautauqua. It first arrived during the earliest years of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, and continued to make an annual appearance in the Snoqualmie Valley, during the show's national circuit, until the mid-1930s.

For those who don't know what the Chautauqua was, it was a movement that brought speakers and entertainers to rural communities, before widespread technology provided instant communication between the small towns. As Ralph Taylor says in *Duvall Immigrant*, "Local children were so influenced by the music and instrumental renditions, that many of them took up music lessons". Of Native American origin, the word "Chautauqua" became the name for the tent shows, which were traveling versions of the first Chautauqua held at Lake Chautauqua in New York.
