

## A Brief Recap of Thomas Matthiesen's Talk "The Hippie Invasion"



# DUVALL in the 1960's and 70's

On Monday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, a full house gathered in the Duvall Visitor and Centennial Center to listen to Thomas Matthiesen talk about Duvall's population growth during the 1960's and 1970's. And what an enlightening talk it was.

The presentation began with a framework of the national events that impacted the 60s and 70s. World War II was a thing of the past, and those who were born shortly after grew up during the Korean and Vietnam Wars, during years that were a combination of good times, air raid drills, civil rights distress, assassinations, peace parades, and drafts. Non-conformity and conformity became topics of interest, and in the 1960s a group emerged that eventually adopted the label of "Hippies".

But Thomas doesn't believe the hippies moved to Duvall. As Thomas stated "Hippies just dropped out of society." Rather, members of the group that moved to 60's and 70's Duvall may have been part of the counter-culture, but instead of drop out of society, they worked within the confines of the system to change that with which they didn't agree. As Thomas said, "These people who came out to Duvall in the 60's and 70's were professionals. They worked in marketing, were teachers, dentists, Boeing professionals... they had good humor, were bright, courteous, inventive, and got along with everybody." These individuals brought important businesses to Main Street including the Silver Spoon

café and the used bookstore, and according to Thomas, were able to combine with the established community of Duvall because of the kind and interesting nature of the people that already resided there, as well as because of the kindness the newcomers brought with them to Duvall.

Thanks, Thomas, for talking with us. Your presentation was a great starting point for learning about this important part of Duvall's history.
