Kick Up Your Heels!

Early 1900's Duvall had all types of entertainment. From imaginative kids staging plays on tree stumps, to the annual Chautauqua (a traveling tent show) that stopped in the Snoqualmie Valley each year, there was plenty to do.

At the festival, we'll have our own stage with acts like the Novelty Hill Ramblers playing popular songs from early America, and Tinker's Dram, a group performing traditional dance music.

Bob Antone will also take the stage, sharing his songs and stories from early Duvall.



Be a Pioneer!

Life wasn't easy in early 1900's Duvall.



Settlers arriving from distant places found that there was butter to churn, corn to grind, rope to make, and clothes to wash by hand on the scrub board.

On Saturday, September 29th, you (and your kids), can do it all.

Learn About Logging

The logging industry was booming in early Duvall. James Duvall was one of the first loggers, followed by many, including the loggers that Kate Dougherty boarded in the Dougherty Farmstead bunkhouse.

At the Heritage Festival you'll hear stories about the loggers, see their belongings, view their tools. You'll even be able to saw a log with your own two hands.

View an Antique Car



Former mayor Lon Brown mounted a calliope on his Model T and drove it around Duvall, advertising the town's theater.

Watch Wool Demonstrations

Long before thread and yarn were mass-produced, wool was prepared,



carded, and spun, often on a spindle. Watch a demonstration and learn how wool was spun in the "Good Old Days".

There will also be quilts, scarecrows, and more!


Listen to the Snoqualmie Tribe
